

Over the last couple of months, since the quarantine was lifted and the world learned of the murder of George Floyd, we in the United States have undergone an upheaval in what we have come to know as "normal". What should have been relief and joy at being given the freedom to venture out in public and attend Mass again, has been turned into reflection on how we perceive and treat those of other races and nationalities, and how much we value our Faith and our country.

As Catholics and Franciscans, those in our fraternity have been either brought up with an appreciation of the dignity of others, or have at least learned to do so later in life, because we know it is what Jesus expects of us. St. Francis himself famously had a dread of lepers from early childhood, which, though prayer, he fought to overcome. In those days, lepers were readily recognized by their ulcerated flesh and the stench which came from their wounds. They were forced to live apart from their communities and families, unloved and uncared for in their painful and ultimately terminal illness. They wore bells to warn others of their approach. No one knew how to cure leprosy. It was a truly dreaded disease, much as we fear COVID-19, and the only defense was to avoid it all costs – as we do when we wear masks, practice social distancing, and sanitize frequently to fight against COVID-19.

St. Francis was able to defeat his revulsion of lepers through fervent prayer and steadfast resolve to please Jesus. He not only overcame his fear and dread of lepers, but he engaged them in brotherly conversation and put his own life at risk by caring for their needs personally. The example of St. Francis serves us well as we venture into examining ourselves when it comes to our dealings with others.

The life of St. Francis also inspires us in our defense of our beloved Church when it is attacked, as we seem to be experiencing currently. Statues depicting our Mother, Jesus, and the saints are being vandalized, and churches are being torched or destroyed. St. Francis would not have reacted to these things with vengeance, but he might have used these dreadful assaults as an opportunity to bring others to Jesus and His Church. We can do no better than to follow his holy example.

Get to Know Novices Virgil and Louise Daniel – by Elizabeth Francis, TOF

The SS Francis and Clare Fraternity is blessed with a number of individuals in formation. This includes wife and husband, Louise and Virgil Daniel, members of St. Nicholas Byzantine Parish in Barberton.

Married for 50 years, they have five children, three grandchildren, one step-grandson---and a granddaughter due in September.

Virgil learned about the Third Order Franciscans from Joanne Angeletti, TOF, a fellow St. Nicholas parishioner. But it took talking with his wife, Louise, whose Aunt Louise was a Third Order Franciscan, to encourage the seed to grow. Now it is blooming. He said, "I came along for the ride." Both bring wonderful gifts to the fraternity, both intellectual and active service.

Louise and Virgil are graduates of Marriage Encounter and are Cursillistas. In June, they celebrated 50 years of marriage. They served as Pre-Cana Coordinators for the Ohio Deanery, Eparchy of Parma for 14 years. It was a blessing for those in the Pre-Cana program to have individuals who truly exhibit the vow of, "Till death do we part."



Virgil earned a B.S. from Bowling Green State University in Secondary Education and Comprehensive Social Studies. During his career as an officer of the U.S. Army, he was assigned to the United Nations as a military observer in the Middle East. This had a special blessing: he and his family made an official Holy Land Pilgrimage.

While in the military he studied at the JFK Center for Military Assistance-Foreign Area Office Course; Defense Language Institute, Staff School. He also earned a Master of Arts in Pastoral Theology at St. Mary-of-the-Wood College in Indiana and a Master of Education, School Counseling at Kent State University. During this time, he also did graduate work in several fields, earning an MA in Pastoral Theology from St. Mary of the Woods College and a Master of Education, School Counseling at Kent State University.

Louise earned a Bachelor of Science Degree at Bowling Green State University and a Master of Education, School Counseling Degree, from Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, LA. A licensed Professional Councilor, she retired from Padua Franciscan High School. She was blessed by connections with Franciscans throughout her life.

This couple is very active in caring for others in a variety of ways. Louise volunteers at a soup kitchen and is a member of the Women's Altar Society at their parish. Virgil is a Master Catechist and a Certified Pastoral Minister in the Diocese of Cleveland. At St. Nicholas Parish he serves as a cantor and assists with adult education.

Louise notes that she likes to ask individuals questions and notes, "I am also a very good listener." This is a gift that is often absent in our society; we hear words, but don't comprehend, or appreciate, what Is really being said.

Louise is attracted to St. John Vianney. "I am particularly drawn to his humility. It is so impressive the hours and hours he spent hearing confessions." Virgil has long admired St. Clare of Assisi and her deep spirituality. "For me, it is her complete confidence in the Real Presence in the Eucharist. The Eucharistic miracle attributed to her complete faith and confidence saving her community from invading forces has always held my attention. I am a Catholic because I believe - actually, I know - that God reached out to me personally through the Eucharist."

Virgil has never really retired. His second career was in high school education. "I retired from the Army into a High School ROTC position in Barberton." When that program concluded he went back to school at Kent State University. Then he taught at Padua Franciscan High School. "For my first three years I was a teacher of theology, particularly Old Testament, but also Church History and Catholic Beliefs." Then he worked to the Counseling Department for 21 years.

Even his path to Catholicism is interesting. He grew up in a Unity Church in Lee's Summit, Missouri, an offshoot of New Thought, broadly related to, but not the same as, Christian Science. In college, he had a crisis of faith and was tending to be an agnostic. But the Lord had a path for him. He dated a series of Catholic women, and then he met Louise. "Being Catholic was not part of the plan. Louise left that entirely up to me. She was Catholic and that wouldn't change for her."

"My journey into the Catholic faith is lengthy. I gave some serious consideration to the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints, the Mormons. Suffice it to say, God had a plan for me and touched me directly through the Eucharist. I made my Profession of Faith in 1975 on the Feast of St. Gertrude (November 16) in Bamberg, Germany. An interesting side note, the chaplain who received me into the faith was an OFM priest. I was confirmed several years later at Fort Bragg, NC."



Where: The Ledges Trail at Cuyahoga Valley National Park

Itinerary:

9:00 am: meet at the parking lot

9:15 am: hiking starts

11:30 am: lunch at Fisher's Café and Pub in Peninsula,

OH

What to bring: water bottle, sturdy shoes for hiking, bug spray. Hiking stick optional but helpful. Also optional, small mat to sit on the ground.

Note: The trail is 1.8 miles long with some steep areas. We will only hike a small and easier section of the trail. There are a few areas with tree roots exposed. It is considered an "again" bile.

Directions: take 8 north. Take exit #10 and make a left on Seasons Rd. Go ¾ of a mile and turn right on Akron Cleveland Rd. Then a left on Kendall Park Rd (1.2 miles). The entrance to the Ledges is about 1 mile on the right side.
