

Something to Consider

We are quickly approaching the Presidential election! We will do well to remember the wise, faithful words of Bishop Thomas J. Paprocki, Bishop of the Diocese of Springfield, Illinois: "You need to think and pray very carefully about your vote, because a vote for a candidate who promotes actions or behaviors that are intrinsically evil and gravely sinful makes you morally complicit and places the eternal salvation of your own soul in serious jeopardy."



Bishop Paprocki's thoughtful pastoral advice is more relevant than ever this year. Neither candidate is ideal in all facets. Perhaps the thing to consider is what we were taught before the last presidential election by our good Fr. Dennis Arambasick, OFM – the five non-negotiables.

As Fr. Dennis explained so clearly to us, the five non-negotiables, all of which are intrinsically evil in the eyes of the Church, are as follows: abortion/contraception, euthanasia, embryonic stem cell research, homosexual "marriage", and human cloning. We can in no way justify, accept, or promote any of these issues in view of our Catholic Faith.

Bishop Paprocki points out, by our vote, we are complicit in promoting the agenda of the person or party which we support. As Catholics and Third Order Franciscans, we must defend the teaching of the Church in our words and actions – 24/7.




Also, Council is still looking for a volunteer to oversee the fraternity photo album. If the Spirit urges you, please see anyone on Council!

For petty thoughts and nasty words inflicted on my friends.


For sometimes losing patience with troubles that I find.

A Letter to My Children – by Virgil Daniel, Novice to the TOF

My Dear Sons and Daughters,

What is very much on our minds, your Mother and I, is the looming election on November 3 – an election that could, indeed, change our country irreparably. Whatever your politics, you must be part of this national conversation and cast a vote in accordance with your conscience. In the end, there is no more important function for citizens of a free nation than to exercise their right to vote. This November, the silence of not voting will matter more than ever.

Mom and I have never missed an election, and 2020 will be no different. We vote in the Primaries, as well, seeking the selection of candidates we believe will be the best for our local, state, and national governance. We will be voting as our conscience, not our emotions, will lead us. As Catholics, this means "an informed conscience" in accordance with Church teaching, with our Catholic faith that comes to us from the Apostles this past nearly two thousand years. This



has real implications for this election – not that it hasn't in the past. As you know and would expect, I research the issues and the candidates; I actually read both Party Platforms.

I proudly wore the uniform of the United States of America for nearly 25 years and believe deeply in the values that are enshrined in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution, values which came down to us now some 244 years after Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and Benjamin Franklin first penned the Declaration. Abraham Lincoln famously called the Declaration, "an apple of gold in a frame of silver," i.e. the Constitution. This also forms my conscience.

For all these reasons, Mom and I want you to know what we are voting for this November in terms of specific issues and trends in recent times – and why. These things carry weight beyond the back-and-forth of political rhetoric. They transcend the sound-bytes that tend to govern our accession of the "daily news," as it were. They are fundamental issues of "truth, justice, and the American way," as the introduction to the 1950s series Superman so famously endorsed.

So, we are voting

- For the unborn infant to survive full-term always, with the possibility of adoption and a full life for those not wanted. This includes those who survive a late-term abortion.
- For institutions, such as the Little Sisters of the Poor, to continue their ministry of love and charity over and against government interference in such things as contraception and gender diversity, issues that impinge upon their faith and core values, issues which they have been forced to defend at least twice in the courts, issues which were decided in their favor by the Supreme Court, only to be harassed in court again. One presidential candidate has vowed to go around the Supreme Court and ensure that the Little Sisters of the Poor adhere to contraception mandates.
 - This would also include private businesses being protected from similar government mandates against their fundamental rights to religious belief and freedom to practice those beliefs even in hiring practices and the decision whether or not to provide services that go against these religious beliefs.
 - This also includes healthcare professionals being forced by government mandate to perform socalled medical procedures that violate their religious beliefs and conscience without losing their license to practice.
- For the Knights of Columbus to continue to protect and promote life from conception to natural death
 without being destroyed as an organization for taking such a stance. To ensure that this organization for
 Catholic men remains what it is without government interference in its policies, practices, or membership
 – and that membership in the Knights is not some kind of a potential religious test for Federal judges and
 offices, something expressly forbidden by the Constitution, but which has reared its ugly head in Senate
 Judiciary Committee hearings.

- Therefore, we are voting that Catholics may continue to practice their faith, in accordance with their consciences, without government mandates upon their faith and practice. In other words, our fundamental right of Religious Freedom and to act according to our consciences. This includes opposing the so-called Equality Act, which would make the positions and beliefs of Catholics irrelevant even criminal offenses in the ongoing gender diversity debate.
 - o Indeed, this means that all persons of good faith and conscience may act in accordance with their religious beliefs and conscience without government interference.
- It goes without saying that one of the most prerogatives of the Presidency is the appointment of justices to the Supreme Court. As the events of the past few years have shown, this is an extremely sensitive issue. On the other hand, justices sitting on the Supreme Court should not be "safe, non-controversial," thus, milquetoast, jurists. They must be persons of character and conviction on both sides of the political divide, but they must not be victims of a "litmus test" for their selection. Indeed, the Constitution forbids such tests, including a test of their religious faith. This is why Senate elections matter as well.
 - We must have originalists and strict Constitutional interpreters sitting on the Federal Bench at all levels. Only the Congress is empowered to legislate under the Constitution, not the Supreme Court.

Finally, we seek to vote for someone for whom the phrase, "God Bless America" is a statement of commitment to the founding principles of our great Republic, someone who isn't silently, under his/her breath, adding, "except where your religious beliefs interfere with my political agenda."

Ongoing Formation – by Pepe Ventosa, TOF

Ongoing Formation for the September Gathering was on the Rule, Constitution, and the Call to Perfection. We began with the prayer to the Holy Spirit. Council is more fully developing an ongoing formation program for the future.

We discussed a series of recurring themes present on these essential TOF documents, including:

- 1. The call to Christian perfection. As Pope Benedict XV said in Sacra Propediem, St. Francis founded the Third Order to give those living in the midst of the world's turmoil a means of acquiring Christian perfection.
- 2. A reference of the TOF as a "school" or "gymnasium" to assist its members in achieving Christian perfection.
- 3. The Third Order being for many, or, as Pope Leo XIII said, "the Third Order was born fitted to a multitude.

We looked into the chapters and sections of the Constitutions. It is essential that members become familiar with this wonderful document. In the upcoming Ongoing Formation sessions, we will be focusing mostly on Chapter II, "The Way of Life". It is in this chapter we enter the "school", the "gymnasium" of the Third Order as we learn about Christian perfection.

We closed this presentation with this challenging quote from Pope Benedict XV: "It is, then, desirable, that in every city, town, and even in each village, the Third Order count henceforth a sufficient group of members, not of inactive adherents satisfied with the mere title of Tertiaries, but instead, of those who spend themselves with zeal for their own salvation and the salvation of their brothers."


