Getting to Know Julia Tarulli, TOF and Jennifer Kerns, TOF

Julia Tarulli, TOF and Jennifer Kerns, TOF have recently transferred into the TOF community and our fraternity, and we are so glad!

Julia and Chet were married 61 years when he passed away three months ago. They had four children. Their son, Timothy, died three years ago. They have ten grandchildren and four great-grandchildren

Julia's most important duty now is prayer, prayers from her heart for our country and her neighbors all around her neighborhood. She believes having Masses offered for our loved ones is important. She loves praying the Psalms and prayers from the "Mother's Prayer Book", and daily readings in the Magnificat. When she's able, she walks with her church in the Pro-Life Walk.

Julia was professed into the OFS at the Fraternity of St. Joseph of the St. Maximilian Kolbe Region on December 5, 1998, in Dover, Ohio. She served as Minister for three years and as Formation Director for several terms.

Lives Well-Lived - Deacon Fred and Joyce Brown



Deacon Dr. Fred Brown, aged 91, who faithfully served at Akron St. Mary until the merger with St. Bernard in 2010, as well as Our Lady of the Cedars Maronite parish in Montrose, died on January 3, 2021. Deacon Fred had been living with his son, Fr. Stephan Brown, SVD at St. Joseph Parish in St. Petersburg, Florida, where Fr. Brown is pastor.

Both Joyce and Deacon Fred were lay Franciscans for 17 years, and assisted in teaching Formation classes to those in discernment. Deacon

Fred also served as interim Spiritual Assistant to our fraternity at one point when no friars were available. After they moved to Florida, Deacon and Joyce continued to offer valuable advice, and assist the Franciscans whenever they were in town. They never became strangers.



Deacon Fred not only preached the Gospel – he and Joyce *lived* it. He was an exemplary Catholic, deacon, Franciscan, family man and servant to his community and parishes, inspiring others to follow his worthy example. We were blessed to be touched by his ministry, and by his dear Joyce, who actively assisted and strengthened Fred, and worked for the Kingdom of God every day of her life. *May the angels lead Fred and Joyce on their journey to Heaven, and may they see the loving face of Jesus!*

Vit arrived to round out our group.

Minister Bob Burtscher, TOF introduced our guests, and then we started with Liturgy of the Hours. Kenny Green, TOF led, assisted by Debbie Ventosa, TOF and Bill Marshall, TOF.

Pepe Ventosa, TOF then read the Gospel of the day as we participated in Lectio Divina, and then, with our partners, we discussed how Jesus spoke to us and prayed together including His message.

Peggy from Embrace spoke to us on their mission of providing help and hope for pregnant women, unborn children, fathers, and families in crisis. All services are free, and the ministry is dedicated to the Lord. Embrace offers supplies and emotional support to families in distress, and functions as a real answer to the death sentence imposed by Planned Parenthood. Steadfast Fathers is an outgrowth of Embrace. They are a men's group for fathers, providing guidance on getting jobs, advice on legal problems, anger management, and help with daily life challenges.



Embrace hopes to someday get permission to speak to high school and middle school students at public schools, which is currently impossible because of COVID restrictions. Cindy Russo, TOF, suggested they approach that age group through Life Teen, which operates in several area parishes. Our fraternity sent a collection of goods for Embrace, including baby supplies and clothing as well as monetary donations.

Maria Elena Meza, TOF, reminds us to continue to pray for our shut ins and the ill. Our brother, Bill Marshall, TOF was present and is in recovery from joint replacements. He cannot kneel yet, but is increasing his walking incrementally – one day at a time!

We then prayed for our general intercessions, including Frater Gastor Bahati, the seminarian of the Diocese of Moshi, Tanzania, whom we have spiritually adopted. We also prayed for our government, healthcare workers, military and police officers, and, as always, our parish priests, bishops, and local seminarians, who sacrifice so much and work tirelessly for our souls.

After enjoying our bagged lunches and catching up with one another, we listened carefully to Fr. Vit's ongoing formation (submitted by Debbie Ventosa):

- 1) Despite all the drama in society, if you live by faith you have a particular direction and goal. No matter what happens around you, nothing will change you.
- 2) Everything God allows is good for something. We must live our lives embracing our life the same way Jesus embraced His own life. We must embrace what God sends the same way Jesus embraced His cross, which He embraced out of love for us.
- 3) God loves us because He is good not because we are good! The love between us and God is eternal. The only thing we take to Heaven is the love we have for God.
- 4) Mystical Theology:

a. We can say things about God and His attributes: He is loving, kind, merciful, omnipotent, just, all-knowing, etc. But our concept of those attributes is limited by the fact we are human and our human brains and experience here on earth limit our ability of truly defining God. God is not able

to be defined by us. God transcends our finite concept of Him.

- b. The closer we grow in relationship to God, the fewer words we have. What we have is silence, in awe and a burning desire for God.
- c. St. Francis sought solitude to refill his heart with the love of God.

Our Gathering concluded by receiving a blessing from Fr. Vit, and the reminder that our next Gathering will be Sunday, February 21 – same time, same place! **Leslie Ann Magda and virtual Linda, OFS**
