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Something to Consider

In this month of December, during the seasons of Advent and Christmas, we are drawn to the Church's unchanging teachings on God's gift of human life as we anticipate and rejoice in the birth of Jesus.

After Our Lady herself, the first human who recognized Jesus was St. John the Baptist, who leapt in St. Elizabeth's womb before Mary even announced she was with child. Think of that – an unborn child recognized another unborn child as his Lord and God!

In 1531, a few short years after Martin Luther inflicted the Reformation on Catholic Europe, resulting in over 5 million souls rejecting Catholicism, the visit of Our Lady of Guadalupe caused over twice as many conversions over a ten-year period in Mexico, and ended the horrific human sacrifices to pagan gods by native people. The Holy Mother of God appeared as a beautiful, regal, pregnant teenaged girl to St. Juan Diego, and spoke his language with motherly tenderness.

Today, humanity is afflicted with the evil of abortion worldwide – even in the most Catholic countries of Ireland and Mexico. At this writing, the Supreme Court is considering rejecting Roe v. Wade, or at least somewhat curbing the endless slaughter of American children.

We must *never* become discouraged or abandon our defense of all human life. Just because it seems the majority legislates evil does not make it moral or justified. **Viva La Virgen de Guadalupe!**

Council continues to work on our fraternity statues. Anyone interested to see what we have done so far can ask a Council member for a copy of the draft.

Eucharistic Adoration and Daily Prayer

Council asks those of us who participate in Eucharistic Adoration – and the rest of our fraternity - to remember the following intentions every day when you pray:

- 1. The spiritual protection of our fraternity and of all our members.
- 2. Those in our fraternity who are sick, and their families.
- 3. Pope Francis and his intentions.
- Our bishops: Bishop David Bonnar of the Diocese of Youngstown, Bishop Milan Lach of the Eparchy of Parma, and Bishop Edward Malesic, JCL of the Diocese of Cleveland.
- 5. The Friars of the Immaculate Conception Province of the OFM, particularly **Fr. Vit Fiala, OFM**, **Fr. Dennis Arambasick, OFM**, and **Fr. Robert Campagna, OFM**, who is the Provincial Friar.
- 6. Our beloved pastors and parish priests, and our parishes, including **Fr. Miron Kerul-Kmec**, who hosts our fraternity every month. We also pray for **Fr. Daniel Dozier, TOF**, an Isolated Tertiary

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who is the pastor of St. George Byzantine Parish in Olympia, Washington, as well as a professor at SS. Cyril and Methodius Byzantine Seminary.

- 7. **Fr. Gastor Temu Bahati**, the newly-ordained priest of the Diocese of Moshi, whom we have spiritually supported for several years.
- 8. **Frater Francis Tumaini** of the Diocese of Moshi, who is the new seminarian we have adopted.
- 9. All the seminarians of St. Mary Seminary and Borromeo Seminary in Cleveland, which serves the Youngstown and Cleveland Dioceses, as well as the seminarians of SS. Cyril and Methodius Byzantine Seminary, which serves the Eparchy of Parma. Council has also decided to spiritually adopt a seminarian from Stark County (Arthur Bodenschatz, Christ the Servant Parish in Canton), from Summit County (Joseph Rohan, St. Joseph Parish in Cuyahoga Falls), and from Capuchin Formation (Christopher Klobuchir). That's a lot! But it is part of our holy Franciscan vocation to prayerfully support our fellow Franciscans, the Pope, our bishops, our priests, and seminarians. We have no Order without faithful Franciscans, no priests without our seminarians, no Eucharist without our priests, and no Church without the Eucharist. All these individuals on the list sacrifice daily for us, and the very least we can do is to pray for them!

Lord, It Is Good for Us to Be Together!

We met for our Gathering on November 13 at the Shrine of Our Lady Comforter of the Afflicted in Youngstown for our annual Day of Recollection. Our gracious hosts were the St. Padre Pio Fraternity of Youngstown, who provided for our every comfort. We had many of our fellow Third Order brothers and sisters from Our Lady of America Fraternity in Ashtabula and St. Padre Pio Fraternity in Youngstown in attendance, in addition to 29 of our own fraternity members. We were also joined by David Dzurillo of Walsh University, who recorded the Day of Recollection, which will be available on our You Tube channel for viewing.

Pat Cuttica, TOF, St. Padre Pio Fraternity Minister, warmly greeted us and led the opening prayer, as well as Grace before breakfast. She and her fraternity made us feel right at home with morning refreshments and beautiful Franciscan hospitality.

Fr. Vit spoke to us on the subject of "The Monk: Monasticism as a Way to Perfection." The spirituality of this is to love God with all your heart, mind, soul, and strength. We witness to the love of Christ.

These witnesses are as follows:

- 1. <u>Martyrdom/Persecution of the Church</u>: We must remain loyal to the teaching of the Church, even in the face of personal danger and ruin.
- 2. Ascetic Life of Monastics and the Institution of the Christian State: The desert monks and the

conventual monks led lives that inspired others by their holiness and orderliness. Lay people admired and respected their lifestyle, which centered on prayer and work for the Glory of God. The monks also served the secular community, and were a model for law and order in the outside world. Thus, the white martyrdom of the ascetic monks who made repentance for the sins of the world. They lived a schedule of life, work and prayer every day. St. Anthony of the Desert is an example, as is the newly beatified Blessed Charles de Foucauld.

The ascetic monks lived in isolation in the desert, in the following way:

- a. Loved God heart, mind, soul, and strength.
- b. Attracted demons to themselves to fight them.
- c. Perfected their love for God.
- d. Sometimes lived in monasteries with other monks.

For monks, theology was simple. Hermits seek interior life and solitude. Many became mystics, and people looked on them as living icons.

3. <u>Third Orders</u>: Humans were created good, but human nature is corrupted by sin. God restores human nature. We have an interior desire for goodness and can change, by the grace of God.

The Third Orders (Dominican, Benedictine, Franciscan, Carmelite, Augustinian, etc.) opened monastic prayer seven times daily to the laity, as well as some other disciplines that are pleasing to God.



Married life is a vocation to the Church. With the

institution of the Third Orders, single and married people without the vocation of Holy Orders could live in service to the Church, in community.

The Holy Spirit designed a new way for us to serve the Church. The corruption never left the Church from the beginning. Thus, the white martyrdom of the ascetic monks who made repentance for the sins of the world.

When we are ready, God will transform us. In order to prepare ourselves, we must do the following:

- 1. Interior change. Faith, prayer, fasting, and repentance will metamorphosize us into more perfect and purified disciples.
- 2. A Christian state is incapable of legislating Faith, leading to failure. It is up to us to live our Faith well, which will influence others.
- 3. Pray without ceasing: Lord Jesus, Son of the Living God, have mercy on me, a sinner. Prayer gives birth to virtue. Prayer must come before anything else.

At this point, we moved to the church. Father Vit led the Ceremony of Canonical Establishment of Local Fraternities and the distribution of certificates to the fraternity ministers – Pat Cuttica, TOF, Minister of St. Padre Pio Fraternity in Youngstown; Paul Fedele, TOF, Minister of Our Lady of America

Fraternity in Ashtabula; and Roberto Meza, TOF, Minister of SS. Francis and Clare Fraternity in Barberton.

Following this, Father exposed the Blessed Sacrament for Adoration, and then, along with Fr. Ryan Furlong, TOF of the St. Padre Pio Fraternity, gave us the opportunity of Confession, followed by the Prayer for the Dead and Benediction.



At Noon, Fr. Vit and Fr. Furlong concelebrated Mass to a full church, which was a great blessing.

We then headed back to the hall for lunch. As always, our brothers and sisters of St. Padre Pio Fraternity fed us very well! It was wonderful to talk to our extended Franciscan family and get caught up, and to get to know each other. With good food and even better company, it was a terrific lunch!

After we finished lunch, it was time for Fr. Vit's afternoon talk. This was entitled, "The Franciscan Tertiary: Interior Monasticism as a Way to Perfection".



Father told us the story of Michelangelo painting his masterpiece, "The Last Supper". Michelangelo liked to model the figures in his paintings from everyday people. He looked to the people he encountered in his home town. In time, he found the perfect models for each of the apostles, and a model for Jesus. He discovered an innocent, beautiful eight-year-old boy and painted him in. *← New Novices Jesse Kuhn, Denise Williams, and Cathy McCausland with Fr. Vit*

Years later, he found the model for Judas in a prison. The man he selected was very hardened. When Michelangelo approached him, the man told him they had met in the past. You guessed it – in his youth, this man was the model for Jesus.

In order to live, we must eat, drink, pray, work, recreate, make time for hygiene and self-care, and deal with the problems we face. We need to process the negativity we meet every day. We must organize our lives, and orient it to the good. Live in the present moment, focus on each task, and enjoy it – including prayer. Do it consciously for the Glory of God.

Be watchful in all things. Beware of idle thoughts – especially when they are violent, angry, sexual, etc. Idleness is the biggest danger to spiritual life. Don't make big changes at the same time. Space it out and do it well. Gradually expand your prayer time.

Don't bring stress home from work. Stop and take a walk first if that helps. Unwind, so when you come home, you do not bring the problems with you.

Monasticism is the school of humanity. Discernment is important. It can save time in your spiritual life.

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A good diet will not only keep you healthy, but will enhance the religious experience, because we can think more clearly.



Emotions in prayer can be a distraction. Even out the highs and lows. These extremes can give us false assurances. We do not seek the gifts of God – we seek the Giver.

Prayer is a form of transformation into the image of God. We are set apart for the Gospel in this world. Do not desecrate yourself.

Process through life. Purify your intentions. When something bad happens, make it a reflex to use ejaculatory prayer – for instance, "Jesus, help me!", or "Jesus, Son of the Living God, have mercy on me, a sinner!" \leftarrow Fr. Vit blessing scapulars and cinctures

Improve slowly, by prayer and sacrifice.

This talk was followed by the Ceremony of Reception into the Novitiate. Fr. Vit performed this as we welcomed Jesse Kuhn, Cathy McCausland, and Denise Williams as our new novices.
