Something to Consider

Along with many of the great saints of the Church, St. Maximilian Kolbe, OFM was devoted to Mary, to whose Immaculate Heart the Church dedicates August.

Raymond Kolbe was born in 1894 in Poland. In common with many Polish families then and now, his family were joyfully devout Catholics. At the age of 10, he had a vision of Mary, who offered him two crowns, one white and the other red. Raymond recalled, "That night I asked the Mother of God what was to become of me. Then she came to me holding two crowns, one white, the other red. She asked me if I was willing to accept either of these crowns. The white one meant that I should persevere in purity and the red that I should become a martyr. I said that I would accept them both."

At the age of 13, Raymond and his older brother entered the Conventual Franciscan seminary. He chose Maximilian as his name while a novice, and in 1914 was sent to Rome. He earned a doctorate in theology and was ordained in 1918, and then taught in the Krakow seminary. At the end of World War I, Fr. Kolbe witnessed the marches led by the Freemasons against the Catholic Church in Italy. He responded by organizing the Army of the Immaculata, which was dedicated to the conversion of sinners and enemies of the Church through the intercession of Mary.

During the 1920s, Fr. Kolbe travelled to India and Japan, where he established monasteries. The Indian monastery eventually closed, but the Nagasaki monastery not only survived the atomic bomb, but the priests and brothers, who were praying the Rosary when the bombing started as they did every day before Mass, were spared radiation burns and poisoning despite being only a mile from ground zero, with no casualties.

Fr. Kolbe returned to Poland and was placed in charge of his monastery. He and his Franciscan brothers published a monthly magazine as well as a daily newspaper which had a circulation of over 300,000. He started a radio station and broadcast Catholic programing. When the Nazis invaded Poland in 1939, Fr. Kolbe's monastery offered sanctuary, food, and medical care to over 2,000 Jews who were in hiding on their journey to escape.

In 1941, Fr. Kolbe was arrested by the Nazis, beaten, tortured, and imprisoned in Auschwitz, where he was put to hard labor. He took this opportunity to bring his ministry to the prisoners, and secretly offered Mass and Confessions and brought spiritual comfort. When a Polish family man was sentenced to die along with 11 other men by starvation in a hot, windowless metal bunker, Fr. Kolbe asked to take the poor man's place, and continued his ministry with the doomed men. Fr. Kolbe was the last to die two weeks later by lethal injection on the eve of the Feast of the Assumption, having gained both the white crown of purity and the red crown of martyrdom. He was canonized by St. Pope John Paul II in 1982.



Our Annual Picnic on August 20 at Queen of Heaven Parish, 1800 Steese Road, Uniontown, 44685 will take the place of our August Gathering.


Anna Butts will prepare the Little Portion, and Kenny Green, TOF and Bill Marshall, TOF will deliver.

It is part of our Franciscan duty to make proper arrangements for our funerals and wills. St. Francis himself went to the trouble of making things easier for his brothers by communicating his wishes before he entered eternal life.

Please contact Roberto Meza, TOF to fill out the form for the Franciscan wake service if this is part of your plans – **even if you have already submitted a form previously**. Your Franciscan brothers and sisters are willing to pray the wake service at the calling hours or before the funeral, and your non-Franciscan family members will find this a great comfort.

Debbie Ventosa, TOF has been in communication with Paula, a local woman who sews and has patterns for the habit lay Franciscans wear in death, which is similar to the OFM habit. We hope to have her visit one of our Gatherings with samples and information on the cost.

This is not something to leave to your family. When one of the original members of the St. Frances Cabrini OFS fraternity died a few years ago, her family wanted her to be buried in a habit, as her husband had been. But the poor woman had never ordered a habit, and her children were not Franciscans and did not know where to get one. Fortunately, her niece was a member of the fraternity and managed to get one delivered from out of state with only a few hours to spare.

In these post-Covid days, when things are more uncertain and delays are more frequent, it is perhaps better to make arrangements now, so our families are not burdened with these

arrangements. Think about it. See Roberto about the wake service as soon as possible so we have the information on hand. The seamstress for the habits will attend a Gathering soon with more information on how to order a habit.



Eucharistic Adoration and Daily Prayer

Council asks those of us who participate in Eucharistic Adoration – and the rest of our fraternity - to remember the following intentions every day when you pray:

- 1. The spiritual protection of our fraternity and of all our members.
- 2. Those in our fraternity who are sick, and their families.
- 3. **Pope Francis** and his intentions.
- 4. Our bishops and their intentions: **Bishop David Bonnar** of the Diocese of Youngstown, **Bishop Kurt Burnette** of the Eparchy of Parma, **Bishop Earl Fernandes** of the Diocese of Columbus, and **Bishop Edward Malesic, JCL** of the Diocese of Cleveland.
- 5. The Friars of the Immaculate Conception Province of the OFM, particularly Fr. Vit Fiala, OFM, Fr. Dennis Arambasick, OFM, and Fr. Robert Campagna, OFM, who is the Provincial Minister.
- 6. Our beloved, hard-working pastors and parish priests, and our parishes, including Fr. Miron Kerul'-Kmec of St. Nicholas Byzantine Parish (Eparchy of Parma), who hosts our fraternity every month. We also pray for Fr. Daniel Dozier, TOF, an Isolated Tertiary who is the pastor of St. George
 - Byzantine Parish in Olympia, Washington and St. Irene Byzantine Parish in Portland, Oregon, as well as being a professor at SS. Cyril and Methodius Byzantine Seminary and contributor to "Catholic Answers" on EWTN radio. And **Fr. Ryan Furlong, TOF,** who is pastor of St. Thomas the Apostle Parish in Vienna, (Diocese of Youngstown) and who is a member of the St. Padre Pio Fraternity.
- 7. **Fr. Gastor Temu Bahati**, of the Diocese of Moshi who is serving on the staff of his bishop, whom we have spiritually supported for several years.
- 8. Frater Francis Tumaini of the Diocese of Moshi, who is the Moshi seminarian we have adopted.
- 9. All the seminarians of St. Mary Seminary and Borromeo Seminary in Cleveland, which serves the Youngstown and Cleveland Dioceses, as well as the seminarians of SS. Cyril and Methodius Byzantine Seminary, which serves the Eparchy of Parma. Our fraternity has spiritually adopted Arthur Bodenschatz, (Christ the Servant Parish in Canton) from the Diocese of Youngstown, Joseph Rohan, (St. Joseph Parish in Cuyahoga Falls), Alex Krukemeyer, (Our Lady of Victory Parish in Tallmadge), and John Paul Antalek (St. Mary Parish in Akron) from the Diocese of Cleveland. These men, and Frater Francis of the Moshi Seminary, are the future leaders and servants of our Church.
- 10. Please add prayers for the safety and protection of our Ukrainian brothers and sisters, and for the conversion of Russia as Pope Francis has done in his Consecration of Russia and Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Also, for the spiritual and physical protection of Catholic priests, religious, and lay people everywhere, particularly in Nigeria, Peru, Nicaragua, and other countries where our Faith is being attacked.
- 11. For the **protection of all life**, born and unborn, womb to tomb.
- 12. For the blessing of an increase in priestly and religious vocations including the Third Order Franciscans, and for an increase of faithful Catholic marriages and families.

That's a lot! But it is part of our holy Franciscan vocation to prayerfully support our fellow Franciscans, the Pope, our bishops, our priests, and seminarians and anyone in distress and danger. We have no Order without faithful Franciscans, no priests without our seminarians, no Eucharist without our priests, and no Church without the Eucharist. All these individuals on the list sacrifice daily for us, and the very least we can do is to pray for them!



Lord, it is Good for Us to be Together!


We met for our July Gathering on July 16 at St. Nicholas Byzantine Church. There were over 30 in attendance, including John Paul Antalek, Oligario (Jerry) Johnson, John McGough, Fr. Vit, Jess and Carolyn Polleti, Annie Butts, and Fred Kramer.

- Roberto Meza, TOF led us in the Ritual Gathering Opening Prayer.
- Kenny Green, TOF, Debbie Ventosa, TOF and Bill Marshall, TOF led us in Liturgy of the Hours.
- Pepe Ventosa, TOF led the Lectio Divina, and read the Gospel of the day from St. Matthew the parable of the sower of seeds ("Some seed fell on rich soil"; "Whoever has ears ought to hear.") Each table discussed what we heard and how we can bring this message to our faith lives.
- St. Barnabas, Northfield was selected as the recipient of the food pantry offering. Mary Dye, TOF will
 deliver.
- John Paul Antalek, whom we recently added to our list of local seminarians we have spiritually adopted, spoke to us briefly. He told us his vocation story, which began before he was born. His mother, Colleen, was in danger of death near her due date and was in the hospital. This was at the same time St. Pope John Paul was dying in 2005. As St. John Paul's condition worsened, Colleen improved, and vice versa. One night, she was visited by St. John Paul, who told her, "Don't worry. You and the baby will live, but I will go away." Her baby, whom she and her husband Mike named John Paul, was born healthy a few days later, and Colleen recovered. John Paul was brought up in a very devout and loving Catholic family. At his home parish, St. Mary in Akron, John Paul and his three brothers are altar servers, and he and his sister and brother-in-law sing in the choir (little sister Beatrice participates at Mass in the pew with their parents). He prays the Rosary and Liturgy of the Hours daily. John Paul credits a retreat he attended at the age of 12, which was led by an especially joyful priest, with inspiring him to consider serving God and His Church as a priest. With the support of his family, John Paul gave a lot of prayer and thought to his future and decided to apply to Borromeo, where he will start his first year on August 24. He looks forward to the next nine years of seminary as a time of study, work, prayer, and deep discernment. If it turns out that the priesthood is not for him, Borromeo and St. Mary Seminaries will give him an excellent grounding in being a good Catholic family man. He sincerely asked us to continue praying for him, and he will do the same for us.
- Roberto Meza, TOF recognized Judith Hoyt, TOF, whose profession anniversary was in July, as well as Caroline Polleti, Therese Harper, TOF, Cindy Russo, TOF, and Fred Kramer who have birthdays in July.
- Roberto Meza, TOF led Grace before our lunch, prepared by Rose Akins, TOF and Denise Williams, TOF, with assistance from a few others who brought food to share. After enjoying our good lunch and visiting among ourselves, Roberto then led us in the Grace after the meal.
- Kenny Green, TOF led us in Ongoing Formation, which was on Christian Perfection According to the Franciscan Spirit.
 - Article 53 of the Constitution reads: "In order to recognize one another more easily and to be more effectively drawn together in bonds of fraternal charity, tertiaries shall wear an external Franciscan emblem, where this can be prudently done. Further, it is urged that one and the same emblem be worn throughout the world. Likewise, tertiaries shall salute one another with the Franciscan greeting, "pax et bonum (peace and all good)" or any other religious manner according to local usage."
 - Kenny led a discussion recognizing the emblems we use as Franciscans.
 - The Tau cross we receive at Profession and wear daily.
 - The scapular of St. Francis, which we wear daily.
 - The cincture, or white cord, which we wear under our clothing.
 - Franciscan jewelry, such as Tau rings or necklaces, and the San Damiano cross.
 - The Franciscan Crown Rosary, which includes meditations on the seven joys of Mary.

- Kenny has a tattoos with the Tau and others Franciscan emblems.
- We discussed the various greetings we give to others that are religious in nature.
 - "Pax et bonum" is the traditional greeting St. Francis used in speaking and in written correspondence. There is evidence of Franciscan communities using this greeting starting from the 15th century.
 - We often say, "God bless you" when someone sneezes, or in greeting or ending conversations with others.
 - Spanish-speaking people (including Pepe Ventosa, and Roberto and Maria Elena Meza) sometimes say, "Adios", which Roberto explained means "to God".
 - Even "Bless your heart!", which is a Southern phrase, can be considered a religious greeting!
- Kenny reminded us that right from the start, Francis and his friars were committed to preaching peace, not only in words, but with their lifestyle. St. Francis said, "The peace that you proclaim with your mouth, you must have even more abundantly in your hearts."
- Roberto Meza, TOF presented the Infirmarian Report on behalf of Maria Elena Meza, TOF.
 - o Bill Marshall, TOF paid a visit to Elizabeth Francis, TOF. She attends Mass regularly and is volunteering, though not as much as before. She appreciates our prayers.
 - o Jennifer Kerns, TOF was unable to attend the Gathering and is experiencing continuing health concerns. She asks for our prayer support.
 - Mary Cate Roberts, TOF and Julia Tarulli, TOF were present at the Gathering, and we were so glad to see them!
 - Sandy Pollino, OFS is very ill and is in need of prayer support. She is experiencing constant migraines and other health challenges, per Judith Hoyt, TOF.
 - o Judith Hoyt, TOF also reported that Dorothy Takacs, OFS is doing well under the circumstances.
 - o Pat and Deanna Hurley, OFS are keeping busy. Pat's cancer is in remission, thanks be to God.
- Master of Formation Debbie Ventosa, TOF reported our three postulants (Marlene Walker and Carolyn and Dennis Gacioch) are steadily progressing. There will be a Come and See on August 29 to start a new group.
- Roberto Meza, TOF then led us in prayer for the intentions of the fraternity, including the seminarians we have spiritually adopted (Arthur Bodenschatz, Joseph Rohan, Alex Krukemeyer, John Paul Antalek, and Frater Francis Tumaini) as well as all seminarians in the Cleveland and Youngstown Dioceses, Bishop Fernandes of Columbus, Bishop Bonnar of Youngstown, Bishop Burnette of the Eparchy of Parma, and Bishop Malesic, JCL of Cleveland. We also prayed for our own members and families, including Jennifer Kerns, TOF, Julia Tarulli, TOF, Sandy Pollino, OFS, Sheila Burtscher, Nico Ventosa, Larry and Lucy McNutt, TOF, and Dorothy Takacs, OFS.
- Fr. Vit Fiala, OFM spoke on Spiritual Direction in his Ongoing Formation.
 - o In the Sacrament of Confession, the Western and Eastern Rites of the Church take different approaches to spiritual direction.
 - The Western Rite of the Catholic Church encourages us to do our best in following God's teaching and pleasing Him.
 - The Eastern Rite asks, "What do you desire?"
 - We must have a goal.
 - To attain sanctity.
 - To attain sainthood, ultimately.
 - What does sanctity mean, and how do we live it?
 - We must focus on pleasing God.
 - Eastern Rites are not so legalistic.
 - For instance, there is not as much differentiation between mortal sin and venial sin. *All* sin is bad and goes against God.

- The Catholic Church all Rites seeks to produce saints.
- As for scandal:
 - Remember that the Church is never scandalous because it is of God. Individuals can cause scandal, but never the Church.
 - Wolves in sheep's clothing hide behind the Church to obscure their sin.
- We prayed the St. Michael Prayer, and then Roberto led us in the Gathering Closing Prayer.
- Fr. Vit gave us his blessing.
- The annual fraternity picnic will be August 20, and will also be our monthly Gathering. It will take place at Queen of Heaven Parish in Green. Food assignments will be announced.
- Wake service forms are available on the website or contact Roberto. Members are encouraged to give some thought to this and if they would like to have the Wake Service at their funerals.
