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MARY, MOTHER OF GOD SOLEMNITY OF MARY, FEAST DAY, JANUARY 1



*Each year on January 1st we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, The Mother of God. The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes Mary—Mother of Christ, Mother of the Church: 963: **The Virgin Mary. . . is acknowledged and honored as being truly the Mother of God and of the redeemer . . . She is ‘clearly the mother of the members of Christ’ . . . since she has by her charity joined in bringing about the birth of believers in the Church, who are members of its head.***

“Mary, Mother of Christ, Mother of the Church.”

To describe Mary as the Mother of God would be to use the term Theotokas. Theotokas implies that Mary carried God in her womb and gave birth to Him. She was the “God-bearer” and carried the divine person of God in order that He could take on His human nature. Jesus was fully divine in nature and fully human in nature. You could also say Mary was the first tabernacle for Jesus or that she “bore God.” “Mother of God” does not mean Mary was from eternity, it is (Theotokas).

The title “Mother of God” (Theotokos) was confirmed by the First Council of Ephesus in 431. Our individual devotion to Mary, along with the Church, gives credence to her words to Elizabeth in the Magnificent, “all generations will call me blessed.” We honor Mary in the Marian prayer of the Rosary, which gives us her Son, Jesus, in the Gospel as we pray.

The Rosary was given to St. Dominic, the founder of the Dominican Order, according to Tradition, from the Blessed Mother when she had appeared to him as he prayed in the forest. He prayed for three days continually, and with complete fatigue he had fallen into a coma.



Our Lady appeared to him with three angels and said, **Dear Dominic, do you know which weapon the Blessed Trinity wants to use to reform the world?** “Oh, my Lady,” answered St. Dominic, “you know far better than I do, because next to your Son Jesus Christ, you have always been the chief instrument of our salvation.” Mary answers, **“St. Dominic, I want you to know that, in this kind of warfare, the principal weapon has always been the Angelic Psalter, which is the foundation-stone of the New Testament. Therefore, if you want to reach these hardened souls and win them over to God, preach my Psalter.”** (Taken from the book, *Secret of the Rosary* by St. Louis-Marie de Montfort.)

Mary the Mother of God (Theotokas), is our heavenly mother too. She brings us closer to her Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. Especially by praying the Holy Rosary we pray with Mary on the way to her Son in His cross and resurrection.



The Holy Mother of God is the new Eve and Mother of the Church. Mary awaits us in heaven as we pray: “To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve, to thee we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears.”

The Mother of God will lead us to Jesus as our advocate, and a path to holiness. Let us honor Mary, The Mother of God on her Feast day January 1, and pray: Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and

at the hour of our death, AMEN.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

FEAST DAY, January 4, 2026



In the article of January 2024, we reiterated the feast of **“The Epiphany of the Lord”** celebrating Christ’s manifestation into the world. His manifestation was through the visit of the Magi, which also included His baptism at the Jordon river with John the Baptist, and the Wedding at Cana.

It was stated the visit of the Magi, (Mt. 2: 1-12), **“was the Epiphany of an affirmation of universal salvation.”** The Baptism of the Lord, (Mk 1: 9-11), when the Holy Spirit descended in the form of a dove and the voice of God was heard, **“This is my beloved Son.”** The miracle at the Wedding of Cana when Jesus turned the water into wine at the request of the Blessed Virgin Mary. These were considered the three examples of Christ’s most important events in the life of Christ.

What about, **The Presentation of the Lord, The Ascension of the Lord,** or **The Transfiguration of the Lord?**



In the Presentation of the Lord, Jesus submits Himself to the custom of the first born male child to be presented to the Temple, and second, the Blessed Virgin Mary submitting herself to purification after childbirth, according to the law of Moses.

Most importantly, Simeon’s future prophecy to the Blessed Virgin Mary, that a sword would pierce her heart, (Luke 2:35). Mary would suffer along with Christ during His passion and death on the Cross, some years later.





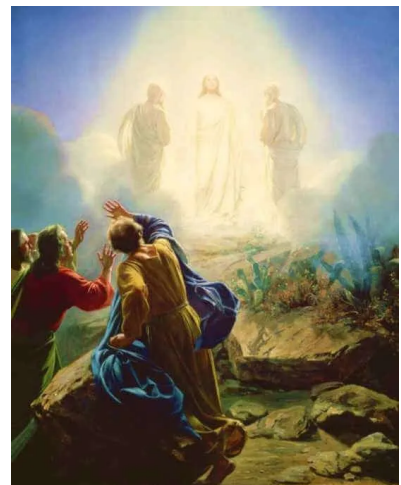
The manifestation of Jesus and His Ascension into heaven, 40 days after His resurrection, must have been amazing and astonishing to the Apostles and disciples of Jesus. Witnessed by them, filled with emotion of joy and sadness, as He was leaving them again after His death on the cross.

Jesus was lifted up by His own accord, and a cloud covered Him as He disappeared into heaven. Now, they were to wait for the Holy Spirit, the Paraclete. **“And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another Advocate, to be**

with you forever.” (John 14:16)

The Transfiguration of Our Lord Jesus Christ reveals His divine nature to the three Apostles as He had brought them to the high mountain of Mt. Tabor. God speaks again revealing Jesus, in His glorified body, as His Son, **“This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased, listen to Him.”** (Mt. 17:5)

Jesus talking with Moses and Elijah, while Jesus is transfigured, with His face “shone like the sun, and His garments became glistening white,” as the three Apostles were in awe. (Mt. 17:2)



Just these three additional manifestations of Jesus tells us the importance of Christ’s time on earth. The Gospel shows the world the love God has for us by giving us His Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ. The entire Gospel is an “Epiphany of the Lord.”

The Padre Pio Foundation states: “Padre Pio viewed the Epiphany as Christ’s manifestation to all nations and a powerful invitation to actively seek, recognize, and live out Christ’s light in the world.”

THE FEAST OF THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

JANUARY 11, 2026



The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord reminds us the Christmas season has come to an end and we begin Ordinary Time the day after this feast.

John the Baptist, the Precursor of our Lord, declares as Jesus approaches the Jordan River, **“Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world,”** (Jn. 1:29).

John knew Him as he stated in (Jn. 1:32), **“I saw the Spirit come down like a dove from the sky and remain upon Him,”** and continues in (Jn. 1:34) **“Now I have seen and testified that He is the Son of God.”** From the Jordan River to the beginning of Christ’s ministry on earth, the Passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus into heaven, culminates at the Jordan River with John the Baptist.

The Lamb of God, our Lord Jesus Christ, asks John the Baptist to baptize Him in the Jordan River. To the astonishment of John the Baptist he says, **“I need to be baptized by You, and yet You are coming to me?”**

(Mt. 3:13-17). John baptizes Jesus and the heavens were opened as the dove from the sky appears and the voice of God says: **“This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased”** (Mt. 3-13-17). It is God Himself who tells us who Jesus is at that moment. A profound declaration by God to send his Son to save us from our sins. Do we need more proof of how much God loves us?

We do not hear of God speaking from the sky today, but it is through our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, that He speaks in the Gospel. The Trinity is revealed at the Baptism of our Lord, the Father, as a voice from Heaven, the Son, Who is Baptized by John the Baptist, and the Holy Spirit, Who appears as a dove from the sky and rests over the head of Jesus.

On this Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, let us be thankful to God for our Lord Jesus Christ who came into the world to save us from our sins, and gave us Confession in His mercy and love for us.

The Faithful Steward

**Study of the Admonitions of St. Francis of Assisi, Lothar Hardick, OFM by:

“Blessed is that servant (Mt. 24:26) who takes no more pride in the good that God says and does through him than in that which he says and does through someone else. It is wrong for anyone to be anxious to receive more from his neighbor than he himself is willing to give God.

This Admonition opens our eyes to true humility in observing the “will of God” in our lives. Lothar Hardick, OFM explains how we should not miss the message from the heart of St. Francis, to indicate we are “Servants of God” in all that we do with the gifts that our Lord has given to each of us. We should acknowledge that Christ has blessed us and give thanks for use of these gifts for His glory and His alone.

How easy it is to forget this message that we are to give God thanks and glory for all that we have in this world. We try so hard when we are at work to do the best we can and seem to expect praise from our neighbor, but we should be thanking God for a job well done and give the glory to Him for what was accomplished. We are stewards of all that has been obtained from our Lord. Even in reading what is written here comes from the Spirit of God in its typing and not knowing what the next paragraph will read.
